Three-Year Limited Term Appointment

The Physics Department, St. Francis Xavier University, invites applications for a **three-year limited term appointment**, commencing July 1, 2021 and ending June 30, 2024, at the rank of Assistant Professor. Applications will be considered from candidates with expertise in any field of physics. This position is subject to final budgetary approval.

The successful candidate will be responsible for 18 credit hours of teaching at the undergraduate level. The specific courses assigned will depend on the particular expertise of the successful candidate. Established experience in teaching undergraduate physics would be an important asset, and a strong commitment to undergraduate teaching is a necessity. Applicants should have completed a Ph.D. in physics. Some postdoctoral experience is preferred, although not a necessity.

The Department is seeking candidates who are committed to contributing to StFX's priorities of equity, diversity, and inclusion. Demonstrated ability in fostering a climate of inclusion in the classroom is an asset.
